The large size can damage the tongue and may also delaminate the upper layers of the flooring causing dimpling of the finished product. Can I purchase this part to upgrade an older model MIII The downside of this design is that the pusher assembly is not able to fully engage the last three cleats to the front nose thus the last three cleats lose the spring tension that keeps them from moving out of position. If the fastener shifts, the driver may miss or jam the fastener. The best way to avoid this is to reload additional cleats before you are out. Are there any special tools for these models This can be ordered as part number BC1009. The MIII812CNCT concrete nailers will use the BC1009 as well, and a wrench, part number BC855 that will aide in removing the poppet screws. Max Power 5.0 out of 5 stars Why do they use this brand instead of a more expensive or a less expensive one. Because this is the industry standard and gives the most bang for the buck. Its basically a large single piston, so there is as few moving parts as possible. The only part not metal is the base, so it doesnt scratch the floor. It comes with a few bases for different floor thicknesses and a rolling slider base if you want to go that route. This is the only way to do a hardwood floor. One thing of note is you will need is a handheld air tool like an angled finish nailer to toein pieces that are against the wall, because the piston is too long all floor nailers are like this. You can use either end of the mallet to drive a nail. The hard end is for when you are closer to the wall, it lets you hit the piston at a 90 degree angle, so you can basically put the piston right up against the wall and drive nails.I do have some experience with the lower cost hardwood floor nail guns. While they did not misfire into the wood very often in my experience they do tend to jam, forcing you to stop working, disconnect the gun, and clean it out.

I am very happy with my purchase and I plan to sell the gun used when I am finished the other 300 square feet I need to install. Resale value on this nail gun is very high, making it more affordable to buy the gun then rent it. Update I have finished my project and the nail gun worked flawlessly throughout all 500 square feet of flooring. I did not have a single jam in the gun, and I only had to rip out a few boards for misfires, all of which were most likely my fault. I also was able to work on my project over a month which I could never had done if I rented a gun. I plan to rent my gun out to two friends so they can install hardwood in their homes and then sell it used. I may even recoup all of my costs back. Update 2 Started on my second project, about 500 square feet of flooring at my friends house. He did have a lot more misfires then I did, however I was not the one using the gun. I feel he was not hitting it hard enough. Also we did have our first jam. The gun was relatively easy to take apart and unjam, just 3 hex bolts. So overall it has fired about 2500 nails thus far, there have been about 50 misfires 90% of which were the fault of the user and one jam. Not bad I think.This was the top rated flooring nailer and I can see why after using it. No miss nails. Works everytime. Only issue I had was operator error when I tried to rush a little bit. The hammer provided is great. This nailer can help tighten up boards as you nail them. I am using the bostitch floor nails with this nailer. Works like a charm.The instructions are complete but somewhat opaque. Once you know what they want you to do the instructions are apparent in their intent. For instance, the foot can be installed in either of two orientations I, of course, had it backwards at first. The irritating thing is that the nailer works in that orientation as well.You really do get what you pay for. We have a beautiful floor says wife, I have bragging rights, and saved a lot of money.

use on prefinished floors included and it did a nice job in protecting the finish. We did find it was very important to make sure the entire foot was square against the previous row of flooring before hitting the pneumatic operation to assure the nail drove in properly and as another safeguard to protect the prefinished wood. We also used a short strip of blue painters tape to cover the silver metal that is located underneath on each side of the hole where the nail comes out also as a precaution to protect the prefinished wood. Schaeffer 5.0 out of 5 stars And I had borrowed my friends setup too many times. To my surprise, I found that I preferred the Bostitch over the air powered tools. It is light, easy to use, and no cords to trip over. It is not quite as fast as a pneumatic nailer, but for household projects it is more than adequate. Once in great while it would misdrive a cleat but the solution is to keep the magazine filled reasonably full. It always happened on the last cleat before the nailer emptied. And although this is designed for full thickness flooring, you can use it on thinner bamboo flooring by installing washers between the plate and the frame. This is DIY modification that is not in the manual. The newer model actually has three different shoes to make this adjustment. Hope this helps a few folks extend the use of their existing nailer. I did a quick search on the internet and found this nailer for a decent price. I couldn't afford the pneumatic ones because of cost plus I don't own an air compressor. First overall impression was its sturdy construction, its very well built. This should last me for years if I ever decide to lay hardwood floors again or if my friends need to borrow it. The mallet that is included is very robust and the weight and balance allows you to impart a nice blow to set the cleat. I have had a few times where I didn't give it a hard enough blow and I didn't set the cleat all the way down. This is the main complaint of this tool I found on the internet and some people prefer the ratcheting manual nailers. But, the complaint of the ratcheting manual nailers was it would jam if you tried to set the last cleat. The Bostitch has set every single cleat every single time. Hasn't jammed once.

So, if I didn't set the cleat all the way on the first blow, I just grabbed my pliers and twisted the cleats head off. Didn't even try pulling it out. The head would fatigue right off at the wood level and I would set another cleat right next to it. So I guess for me, take your pick, take time to fatigue off the cleats unseated head or take time trying to unjam a nailer. In my opinion, a nailer shouldn't have problems with jamming and tools tend to get broken when this happens. Once getting used to the amount of force required to set the cleat, I pretty much set them every single time now. The flooring I've used is prefinished and I haven't had any problems with marring of the finish from this tool. Also,

with the heavy mallet, I can really get the wood up tight to the previous line. If I did do this for a living, I could tell that it would start to stress my wrists and tendons, hence that's the main advantage of the pneumatic nailers. But for the price, I'm quite pleased. I'm really impressed with the results of my floor. Hope this helps. Both tools were new, both were solidly constructed and of good quality. The Bostitch proved far superior to the Porta Nailer due primarily to the ratcheting feature on the Porta Nailer. This does not function well and is a poor design. The Porta nailer would leave cleats half driven or fail to release the cleat from the nailer after the cleat was fully driven. On the Porta Nailer side of the job we spent a lot of time on our knees with a nail set trying to set cleats. We were forced to pull up a few planks because the cleats could not be set or removed. Eventually it was faster to just use the Bostitch than waste man hours with the Porta Nailer. I would just skip it and get an air powered nailer. It takes a short while to get use the swing. You want to hit it pretty hard to force the boards together without splitting the toe. You can build your floor with a nice finish nailer, but the cleat is much sturdier.

Senco cleats from your local hardware works great. You don't need to wait two weeks for the Bostitch. It jammed several times and that required me stopping my work to fix the jam. At this point, with my floor half installed it has jammed to where I can't fix it, therefore, I can't finish the floor with it. It wasn't super expensive, but it did ultimately become a waste of money. Maybe someone else will have better luck than I. I'm still not use to the ratchet drive yet. Smooth action and not too bad on the back. It's the best buy for the price. Take it in to us this week and save 20% on nailer repairs. Check to see if any of these parts are damaged. If they're worn out, buy a new oring kit and replace them. Watch our howto video on replacing the orings in a floor nailer. A common cause of oring damage is lack of lubrication. Generally speaking, nailers need 2 to 3 drops of oil a day. This is the easiest problem to fix. Check the manufacturer's instructions to make sure that you're using the right fastener size and type, and buy new ones if you're not. If you are using the right nails but you still have trouble getting them through the channel, the driving gauge might be jammed. To check if this is the case, disassemble the nail guide and look for problems. Remove any obstructions you find, then reassemble the nail guide. Often, a buildup of glue residue and debris will also cause cleats, nails, or staples to jam. Check to see if any fasteners are stuck or wedged in the driver tip or feeder. Use a small nail or cleat to remove any fasteners that are stuck. Again, be sure that you are using the proper nails as specified by the nailer's manufacturer. Using improper nails can damage your tool. Using your nailer with the wrong air pressure setting on your compressor can also cause your nailer to work improperly. It can even damage the driving blade. Typically, floor nailers operate at 90-100 PSI. Refer to your tool's user manual for the proper calibrations.

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Refer to the manufacturer's specifications to find the correct PSI. Much like the orings, you need to add an oil film on the cylinder to make sure your nailer performs at its peak. Another possible issue is that something could be jammed or wedged in the driving blade. Check to make sure that the blade is free of any obstructions. As you've probably noticed, a common theme to these problems stems from a failure to lubricate the nailer with oil. Make sure you are adding oil to your tool after a day of use. Usually, two to three drops will do the trick. This quick and simple act of maintenance can significantly improve the longevity and performance of your nailer. Ive only used the air powered cleat nailers before, and plan on getting something pneumatic heard to many horror stories about using the manual nailers. So what would you guys recommend, cleat nailer or stapler for example bostitch MIIIFN vs MIIIFS. A brisk tap is all that is required, not a full hammer blow. Your foot still pushes the pedal down, but the vacuum assist does most of the work. In this area at least, all the floor guys use the Bostitch Mark III stapler. PortaNailer Hopefully itll all work out. Next chance you get, you should try one out.

Better try out two so you can have one for your helper since your gonna buy him his own Max framer to use. IMO the stapler will hold better two legs compared to one cleat and also a little thinner, less chance of splitting wood. Good luck Completely awesome and so light weight. not to mention real purdy. I can run the same amt of flooring in a day as with the pneumatics but feel it more. Gotta get the cardiac workout occasionally somehow. The only jams Ive ever had were from not striking hard enough. Only use it once or twice a year but itll make a good door stop meantime. Then it was out with the hammer and punch if I was lucky or the Dremel to saw the thing off if I wasnt. What a nuisance! It was a lot of work for my first floor job and I eventually realized it was ok to swing the mallet with two hands and I didnt have to impress myself. I didnt have a big problem with jams. An amazing difference, much easier. It almost makes nailing flooring down fun, especially compared to the old way. The cleats work well on standard oak, but still split some tongues on hard maple flooring. I learned not to nail too close to the edge of the board, and to squirt a little wood glue in the tongue on the splits. The nailer leaks a little and the pounding tends to loosen up the bolts holding down the shoe, but it still works fine. Or at least that is what everybody who borrows it from me says it just went out the door again on Monday. Ive got a replacement bag of O rings for when it gets too bad. That cant be right. Now Im even more confused. That means Im Dusty, Lefty and Confused, especially this late at night. But the cabinets are installed, the daughter has finished her math homework, the 1980 Volvos drivers door is back on the car a long story to go in a different thread maybe, and Im about to put a bucket of assorted tools and parts away and feed the cats. LOVE IT! One jam in probably 3,000sq ft of flooring. Bamboo.

I can install all day, and both arms are still the same length, as opposed to when Ive used manual portanailer. When ever I wonder what my favorite tool is, I realize that its the one Im using at the time, so at this point, it is definatly my flooring nailer!
